Goals and Challenges

JSCF receives support from so many sources. Our main source of funds for the endowment is YOU; individual donations contributed each year are the base for our endowment. We raise one dollar at a time, one donor at a time. But we also have supporters that provide incentives for us, and for you. We are an affiliate of the Alaska Community Foundation; ACF provides administrative support. We receive a large grant from the MatSu Health Foundation (MSHF), and we are challenged each year by the Rasmuson Foundation.

Last December we successfully completed a four-year challenge from Rasmuson to raise \$40,000 each year. We met the challenge, and Rasmuson matched the \$40,000 each year. Through your individual contributions, the expertise of ACF, the financial match of Rasmuson, the generosity of MSHF, and a dynamic market, the Jessica Stevens Community Foundation endowment has now grown to be more than \$1,000,000! We are excited about that number; you'll hear more about it in the near future. There is so much more success to come. And, there's so much more work to do.

Rasmuson renewed the challenge! Just as we were feeling good about meeting it and hitting our goals, Rasmuson said they have another opportunity for us. They will match \$30,000 each year for the next four years. JSCF set a goal of raising \$10,000 for our grant endowment and \$20,000 for our operating endowment in this calendar year. We plan to continue to increase our funding for grants to local organizations, and we also need to grow our operating endowment to support our operations into the future.

JSCF does not have a large operating expense but it is real, and while we have been thriving with the support of ACF, we do need to be self-sufficient. Rasmuson's challenge is designed to help us get to self-sufficiency. With your continued support, we'll get there. Healthy communities don't happen by chance; healthy endowments don't happen by chance either.

2021 JSCF Healthy Community Grants

The Jessica Stevens Community Foundation is excited to announce our 2021 Healthy Community grant recipients. When reviewing grant requests, JSCF considers five areas of interest, including compassionate health care, enjoyment of the natural environment, social engagement, artistic expression, and innovative education.

The American Cancer Society requested funds to transport Northern Susitna Valley residents to treatment and provide lodging as needed. How reassuring to know when experiencing a health crisis, a ride or a place to stay will not be a barrier. We cannot think of a better definition of compassionate healthcare.

Another JSCF area of focus includes enjoyment of the natural environment. The Denali Education Center (DEC) promotes a connection to nature by offering day camps at their Talkeetna campus. These programs allow kids to explore and become familiar with their backyard — the boreal forest.

The Jessica Stevens Community Foundation also promotes social engagement. Due to great interest, Talkeetna Youth Hockey created a curling committee and asked for a grant to purchase basic curling equipment. Talkeetna enjoyed two popular and engaging workshops and Bonspiels. This equipment will allow the Upper Susitna area to enjoy curling for years to come.

A dedicated art teacher is not supported by the School District at the Talkeetna Elementary School. Undaunted, the Talkeetna PTA worked tirelessly to fill that gap through grants and fundraisers. This year, they requested money for art supplies for students. JSCF happily granted the money in order to promote artistic expression in our youngest artists.

This year, we provided three grants in support of creative ways of learning. Firstly, we supported the Talkeetna Historical Society's mission to preserve our past and inspire the future. The Historical Society plans a major renovation of the schoolhouse museum. As keepers of our history, the Talkeetna Historical Society

does important, innovative work disseminating our stories. Next, we assisted KTNA in their mission to provide informational programming by granting money for local news. Finally, Denali Arts Council and Talkeetna Elementary School partnered in order to furnish three artists in residence for the elementary school. Jody Fitzgerald, Karen Mannix, and Bekah Mathiesen will work with kids to find their artistic passions. At JSCF, we feel all three programs exemplify innovative education at its best.



Lastly, JSCF's mission includes helping the underserved in the community. Three area nonprofits sought money to provide help to those in need. The Trapper Creek Free Box is a labor of love. Their grant money is used to remove trash, heat the building, and keep the lights on for a year all while providing gently used clothing for the Northern Valley. The Sunshine Community Health Center sought money to support their Families in Crisis Fund which helps families by paying for emergency needs. The Upper Susitna Food Pantry requested money for their annual Thanksgiving Blessing. Your donations

mean others in our community will be able to enjoy a Thanksgiving dinner.

The money to finance these grants comes from the interest earned on our endowment funds. Your donations make it possible for JSCF to continue to serve its primary purpose of supporting the community through its nonprofits who do a wonderful job of caring for our community. Thank you for allowing us to help worthy causes in our beautiful valley.
